

#### NVSA: A CAPSULE HISTORY


The Northeast Victorian Studies Association traces its origins to a group of scholars from Amherst. Hampshire. Mount Holyoke. Smith, and the Amherst camous of the University of Massachusetts, who in the late 1960's established the Five -College Victorian Seminar to promote interdisciplinary Victorian studies. In April 1971, the group sponsored a conference on England in the 1870's: A Decade of Conflict. which included panels on science and religion. on the role of women, and on culture and aesthetic values. Amono the participants were Victorianists well known to NVSA members: John Bicknell moderated a panel on theologians and scientific thinkers: Maurianne Adams, Dorothy Helly, Coral Lansbury, and Robert Preyer spoke and presented papers; and Michael Wolff summarized and editomized. Witnessing events were future NVSA members who found themselves enlightened and enlivened by the multi-disciplinary approach and congenial atmosphere of the sessions.

Other conferences sponsored by the Five Colleges followed: a mini-conference on Victorian Povery (1972) and a full session on William Morris (1973). At a meeting on The Victorian Family (1975), hosted by Assumption College, NVSA was formally organized, adopting as its primary task the sponsorship of a yearly conference. Maurianne Adams became the first president and Robert Keane, the first secretary-treasurer. In 1977 NVSA members approved a constitution and started its own Victorian Studies Bulletin.

Over the next several years conferences alternated between host colleges in the northern section of our area (Boston College, University of Rhode Island, University of Hartford, Rhode Island College, Yale/Albertus Magnus) and in the southern section (Hofstra, Penn, Drew), covering such topics as War and Violence, the 1880's, Victorians and the World Abroad, Victorian Mythologies, Money, Loss and Failure, and The Victorian Frame of Mind on its 27th anniversary.

Last year NVSA panels pursued "Victorian Work and Workers" their mines and sweatshops, studios and factories. This year the counter-topic (or co-topic, isn't it?) "Victorian Pleasures: Food, Fun, and Sames" takes center stage, fittingly enough at pastoral wheaton College, judged one of Massachusetts' most beautifully designed campuses in a recent Boston <u>Slobe</u> article. Pleasures high and low, urban-frenetic and bucolic, literary, culinary and pugilistic (among others) are up for analysis, generating the work the members of NVSA find the most fun of all - talking to each other.


